Dear Colleagues,

I am writing in support of Daisy Villafuerte's request for a California Planning Foundation scholarship. I have known Daisy for a relatively short time, but I am confident in stating that she exemplifies the qualities I believe the CPF is attempting to reward in their scholarship program. Coming out of a difficult childhood, she has succeeded in redefining her life through her work in the field of urban planning. Not only does she have a good heart, Daisy also has a great desire to become a planner who can make a difference for her community.

I met Daisy when she applied to the USC planning program. We had a few preliminary discussions about her decision to attend USC rather than other programs. She was kind enough to suggest that she wanted to work with my colleagues and myself because we were committed to the type of planning that matter to her. Since she entered the program she has completed one course with me, in planning history, and is currently enrolled in a second, in community health planning. My judgments are based on the formal and informal contacts we have had.

Daisy is a shy, quiet student who is very capable and when she opens up, quite delightful. Her work in my classes has varied from still maturing to quite inventive. She has worked effectively with her peers, and has gradually opened up in class discussions.

The best example of her capabilities came through in the current class. One assignment in the class asks a small group of students to develop and present material on a topic to the class. Essentially, they needed to do a case study on a community health planning topic of their choice, researching the issue, creating a Powerpoint presentation, writing a case summary, and finding an appropriate reading for the other members of the class.

Daisy's group chose transportation barriers to access for healthcare. They successfully demonstrated that their case study, an innovative health promotion program in Detroit that used low-income women as drivers could transform the development of a van ridership transportation program into a successful health and life education intervention that dramatically helped the women involved.

The group's presentation to the class was equally successful, as they brought the issue back to Los Angeles, suggesting that our area has equally distressing disparities in access to high quality healthcare, and arguing for solutions that would improve access – such as the use of Uber that is being experimented with in New York City.

The evening's class reflected Daisy's deep interest in the relationship of planning and health, yet it also showed that she is imagining new ways that traditional planning subfields, such as transportation planning, can play a role in improving communities.



The same type of gentle persuasion implicit in the class presentation characterizes many of her comments in class. She is thoughtful, diligent at reading the assigned papers, and makes clear and important contributions to our discussions.

Daisy is an ideal candidate for your award. She is intellectually capable, dedicated to the profession of planning, and emerging from a community unrepresented in the planning profession. I hope you will support her application.
